

with a tie strip sewn in. Press the seams toward the tie for a smoother fit.

CRAFTNOTES: TYING A TIE

These are three basic tie knots, drawn and described as if you were looking in the mirror.

Your left in the mirror.



Your right in the mirror.



Four-in-hand

The wide end is reflected on your right, extending about 12 inches below the narrow end.

Cross the wide end over the narrow and back underneath.

Continue around, passing the wide end across the front of the narrow end once more.

Bring the wide end up through the neck loop.

Pull the wide end down through the front loop, then tighten the knot.

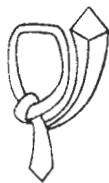


Windsor

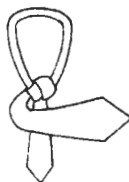
The wide end is reflected on your right, extending about 12 inches below the narrow end.



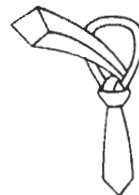
Cross the wide end over the narrow and bring it up through the neck loop.



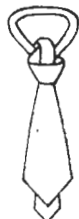
Bring the wide end down, around, and behind the narrow end, then up on your right.



Pull the wide end back through the neck loop and across the narrow end.



Turn the wide end and pass it up through the neck loop.



Slip the wide end through the front loop and tighten the knot.



Half-Windsor

The wide end is reflected on your right, extending about 12 inches below the narrow end.



Cross the wide end over the narrow end and turn it back underneath.



Bring the wide end up through the neck loop.



Pass the wide end around the front of the tie.



Bring the wide end up through the neck loop.



Slip the wide end down through the front loop and tighten the knot.

The bottom one is the idea I tried on your ties I was almost right. Must practise on my long ties
