There's something new in the national parks and forests this summer—a clever sign language that's designed to help you find what you're looking for quickly.

Modeled on the European traffic symbols, which obliterate language barriers, the new signs use no words to direct you. Why not test your ability to decipher them? We've turned the identities below upside down to give you time to figure out any symbols that aren't readily intelligible to you.



Answers

Read down from top in each column.

First column: firearms, trucks, lighthouse, fish hatchery, drinking water, pedestrian crossing, lodging, men's rest room, first aid, mechanic, lockers, vehicle ferry, viewing area.
 Second column: smoking, tunnel, falling rocks, deer-viewing area, information, pets on leash, food service, rest rooms, telephone, handicapped, bus stop, parking, sleeping shelter.
 Third column: automobiles, lookout tower, dam, bear-viewing area, ranger station, environmental-study area, grocery store, women's rest room, Post Office, airport, gas station, showers, campground.
 Fourth column: picnic shelter, campfire, kennel, downhill skiing, ice skating, marina, sailing, boating, surfing, diving, trail-bike trail, hiking trail, tramway, interpretive trail.
 Fifth column: trailer sites, trail shelter, winter-recreation area, ski jumping, ski bobbing, launching ramp, rowboating, scuba diving, fishing, bicycle trail, playground, hunting, interpretive auto road.
 Sixth column: trailer sanitary station, picnic area, cross-country skiing, sledding, snowmobiling, motorboating, water-skiing, swimming, horse trail, recreation-vehicle trail, amphitheater, stable, prohibiting slash.
